Pastoral Letter to Families With Children. . .

We want your children. I just cannot think of a more direct and simple way to begin a pastoral letter about fall Christian Education at Leesburg Presbyterian. Since May, I have been meeting with the Christian Education Committee, the Adult Studies Task Force and also with the Search Committee for a staff person primarily responsible for this vital area of the church's ministry. A common thread in the conversations of these three different groups is how much we want the children of LPC to be part of a learning, growing, interesting, fun experience of Christian community on Sunday mornings.



We have fabulous teachers. Never have I been in a church where so many talented individuals are so devoted to teaching the Christian faith to your children. Never. But even so, we have experienced significantly diminishing numbers of children participating in Sunday morning educational opportunities.

We understand the many challenges folks have in getting their children and themselves to Sunday School. It's the one morning families have to relax and have a leisurely breakfast together. One doesn't need any more issues to argue about with the kids. Moms and Dads are tired from a week of work. Adults really aren't that interested in attending a Sunday School class for themselves etc. ... Balking children, tired adults—it's an accomplishment just to make it to worship! Believe me, I understand and the Sunday School teachers understand!

But, still we want your children. We want your children even if you, the parents, are not in a Sunday School class or even in the church building. We want parents to feel free to bring a child to church school at 9:45 am and then return home to get dressed for worship or to walk down the street to SHOES for coffee. Better yet, come upstairs to the Fellowship Hall and relax and visit with other folks over a cup of coffee or the Sunday *Washington Post*. Or try out the adult studies class that will be taught downstairs in the church parlor.

Adults - Structured Christian education downstairs, unstructured Christian community upstairs
Children- Happily engaged with wonderful teachers and learning experiences upstairs and downstairs!

Yes, we want your children! There will be classes for 3 year olds – 5th graders. Middle school and high school age youth are invited to relax and visit in the DEN (old middle school Sunday school room). Experiences of Bible study and Christian formation will be held for them on Sunday evenings!

But we want your children because we want all of us to fulfill the baptismal promise we made to God about your children—that we would pray for them, know them, call them by name, and nourish them on their faith journey so that they come to know Jesus as their Friend and Savior and themselves as his disciples.

This is important stuff—the work of Christian formation. Let's get together on this!

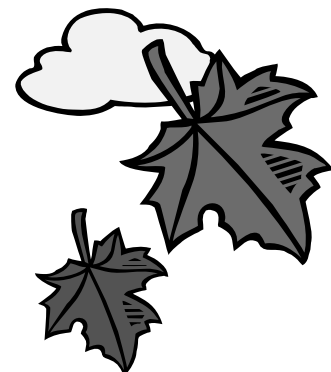
Fall programs begin September 9, 2012

Children's Church School begins September 9 at 9:45! This fall we will be offering three classes. A preschool class for 3's and 4's will meet in the large downstairs classroom. The K-2nd grade class and the 3rd-5th grade class will be meeting in the upstairs classrooms. Teachers will be in the hallways to help direct you. Families with school aged children, look for more information in the mail.

Adult Christian Education begins September 9 with a 4 week class to conclude last year's series, "Everything You Ever Wanted to Know ..." John Sawyer will lead the class on Eschatology and Resurrection. See details below.

"Faith in the Public Square" begins October 7 with a 3 week course led by Laura Herring, entitled, "Civility: American Politics and Christian Responses," followed by a series of guest speakers.

Eschatology and the Resurrection

Sundays, September 9—30, 9:45 a.m.

What is eschatology and why should we care about it? Will you be resurrected and why should you care about that? This is the last in the series of courses we began last year studying some of the principles of Reformed Theology. It is fitting that we should conclude our study with these two topics. *Eschatology* literally means the study of last things.

We will examine what we and other have thought the scriptures mean by the end of the world and the coming of Christ's Kingdom here on earth. We will ask the questions "is the focus of the Christian life to get to heaven?" How do the secular idea and the Christian idea of the goal of history differ, if they do? Is the Christian's hope for a new world and the destruction of the old world or for the renewal of this world? What, if any, is the role of the Christian in bringing about this end? Should Christians today believe in a bodily resurrection? Should we believe in a final judgment? Is it appropriate to believe that some people will be condemned to hell? These are hard questions for all of us to answer, but the secular world is prepared to ask them of professing Christians and as such we should be prepared to give our answers. It is the goal of this course to offer some thoughts and tools which will equip us to come to grips with these and other questions.

Update on the Capital Improvement Campaign Generation to Generation!

Have you noticed some changes around Leesburg Presbyterian Church? Due to the generosity of several in our congregation, we have been able to begin sprucing up both the sanctuary and fellowship hall!

As of August, LPC participants to this campaign have covered the costs for:

- Repairing and painting of the pews as well as painting the sanctuary and office doors
- Re-carpeting and painting fellowship hall
- Replacing the air conditioning unit in fellowship hall
- Coming soon!! Replacing the sanctuary carpet including a beautiful new runner in the narthex



While we've made great progress, there is still much work to be done! Our next priority is to do much needed repairs to the front walkways, expected to cost between \$19,000 and \$25,000. Second, we'll renovate the bathrooms in the education wing. The Property Committee has decided not to rearrange the bathrooms, requiring multiple permits and significant plumbing changes. Instead, we'll paint and replace fixtures and hardware.

In the long term, we need to replace/repair the windows to create a more energy efficient building, make significant repairs to the organ, and increase the "safety-net" fund for building emergencies.

These goals can only happen with your help! **As of the middle of August, we have received \$41,670 in pledges to our three year campaign, of which \$16,080 has already been received.** This commitment represents only 12% of our goal of \$350,000.

What can I do to help?

Pledges and donations are currently being accepted! Simply complete a capital campaign pledge card and drop it in the Sunday offering, or mail it to the church office. If making donations, please note in the memo line that the contribution is specifically designated for the capital campaign.

Will there be a Campaign Commitment Sunday?

No. This is an ongoing campaign that began in May and will run for three years. Pledges and commitments are gratefully received at any time!

Thank you for your participation in our campaign to be good, thoughtful and long-term thinkers regarding stewardship of our wonderful building and grounds!

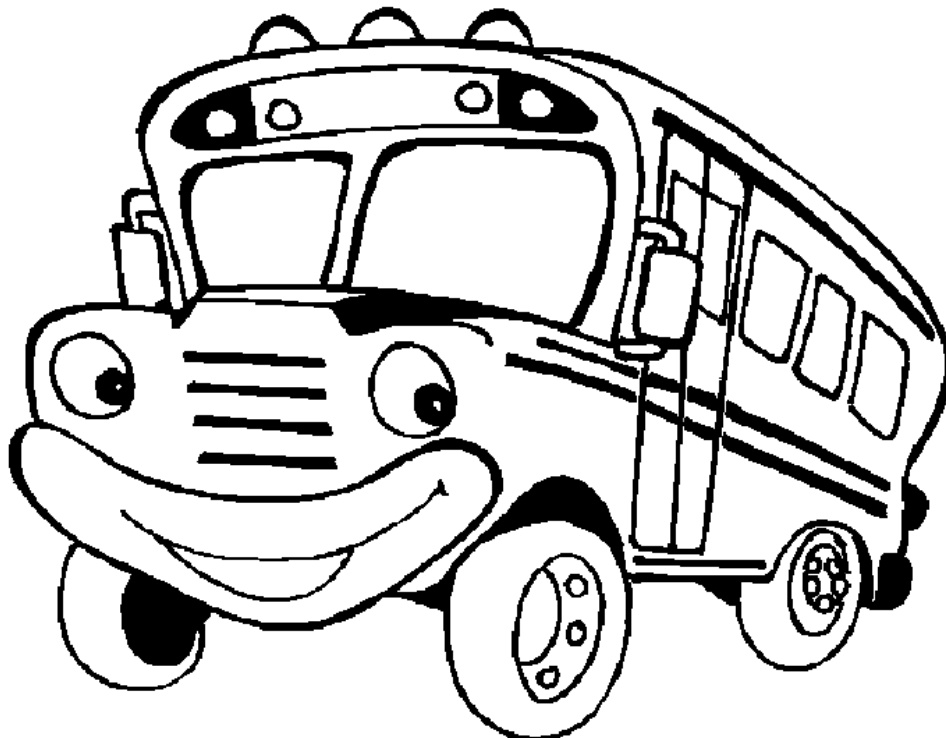
Dear Friends,
